OSSE will provide **high-quality data and analysis** that will empower LEAs¹, CBOs², and providers to meet the needs of all learners and allow education partners to make informed policy decisions



OSSE will work with our education partners to set **high expectations for program quality** and align incentives to accelerate achievement for those learners most in need



OSSE will provide **responsive**, **consistent**, **and considerate customer service** to free up LEAs, CBOs, and providers and allow them to focus on instruction and support for students



OSSE will attract, develop, and retain **top-notch talent** to build a highly effective state education agency that makes a meaningful contribution to DC education




DC is Making Tremendous Progress

- More families are choosing public schools
 - Since 2007, overall enrollment in public schools has increased by more than 13,000 students
 - For the past four years, enrollment has grown in both DCPS and public charter schools
- Strong, sustained progress on the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)



Overall Results

The percent of students who are on track for the next grade level and to leave high school ready for college and career (scoring 4+) increased overall for both ELA and math.



Nearly all specific groups of students saw growth in the percent of students scoring 4+ with the greatest gains for economically disadvantaged students at 4 points.

Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA)

The ESEA's intent is to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education.



The Every Student Succeeds Act

- Reauthorized the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) in December, 2015
- DC schools will fully transition to the new law before the 2017-18 school year
- Emphasizes transparency through increased public reporting
- Additional transparency around performance of particular groups of students
 - English learners, homeless, foster care, students of military families



Developing the SEA Plan: OSSE's Timeline

- August: Launch of public engagement plan, surveys
- September: Internal analysis of law and survey results
- October: Analysis of survey results and external focus groups
- November & December: OSSE drafting of the plan
- January: Posting of plan for public comment; community meetings with SBOE
- February: Finalization of plan; vote by SBOE
- March: Submission of plan to USDE*
- Jan-July: Planning and engagement on school report card
- Dec 2018: First school report card submission





What is an Accountability System?

 Uses academic performance and other factors to show how well schools are doing

 System is then used to identify good schools and schools in need of support

 DC is creating a plan to make sure every school can be a good school



Opportunity for Accountability in DC

- Common model of school accountability for all schools in DC
- Identify low performing schools across both sectors
- Drive improvement and recognition
- Clear reporting and information for families to make choices



Principles

Is **transparent** and provides information about how all of our schools are serving all students

Values comparability

Emphasizes equity

Values growth and performance

Focuses on building the best system, even if that requires growing into it



Parts of Accountability System

System must consider all students in all schools

Academic achievement

- State assessments (PARCC and MSAA)
- Growth and performance

English language proficiency

- -How well students are learning English
- -Different from performance on English language arts assessment

Graduation rate

- 4 year graduation rate
- Possible other measures

At least one other indicator

- -School quality and student success
- -Examples: attendance, school climate, Advanced Placement performance



Feedback Surveys

As a District, we cannot become the fastest improving State without partnering with those closest to our students— parents, families, and community based organizations must be a part of the development and implementation of the State Education Plan.

Two key opportunities for your involvement:

- The State Education Plan
- The LEA Plan



Highlights of Feedback to Date

- Value growth from year to year
- Consider specific groups of students
- Prepare students for post-secondary
- Measure student and parent engagement
- Focus on support rather than punishment
- Avoid unintended consequences, burden on educators
