### DC CAS TESTING 2011 OVERVIEW

- The District of Columbia Comprehensive Assessment System (DC CAS) is administered annually to approximately 35,000 students in grades 3<sup>rd</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>
- Students are tested in mathematics, reading, composition, science, and biology
- In April 2011, the DC CAS was administered in 262 schools across the District
- DC CAS scores are used for many high stakes decisions

### PREVENTIVE MEASURES

- Training for test chairpersons
- 80 schools identified for monitoring by OSSE
- Testing "Violation Form" title was changed to "Incident Report"
- Test security seals were placed on test booklets
- Material tracking procedures were implemented

## DETECTION

- Forensic analysis was conducted using three flagging criteria:
  - Wrong-to-Right Erasures
  - Student Growth
  - Within-Classroom Variance
- Classrooms flagged in 2 of the 3 criteria, or when consecutive years of wrong-to-right erasure flags were investigated
- Of 5,089 classrooms tested, OSSE flagged 34 classrooms
- LEAs were given the opportunity to flag additional classrooms
  - DCPS flagged 36 additional classrooms
- Total flagged: 70 classrooms (38 schools)
  - 60 DCPS Classrooms (30 schools)
  - 10 PCS Classrooms (8 schools)

### INVESTIGATION

- In past practice, once notified by OSSE, LEAs conducted their own investigations
- This year, for the first time, OSSE hired A&M, an independent vendor, to conduct investigations
- LEAs were given the opportunity to flag additional classrooms if they deemed it necessary
  - DCPS added 36 classrooms
- A total of 70 classrooms were investigated in 38 schools

### **INVESTIGATION PROCESS**

## OSSE generated roster of 2011 classrooms to investigate

- OSSE received wrong-toright erasure results from CTB/McGraw Hill
- OSSE identified classrooms with unusual student growth
- OSSE ran analysis of variation within classroom
- OSSE combined three analyses with the 2010 wrong-to-right erasure report
- DCPS provided OSSE with additional classrooms

## OSSE provided vendor with list of classrooms and forensic data

- A&M reviewed OSSE test documents
- OSSE and A&M discussed investigative protocols
- A&M conducted the investigations
- A&M gave OSSE reports of findings
- OSSE made final determinations

### **OSSE Flagging Methodology**

### OVERVIEW OF INVESTIGATION DURING SCHOOL VISITS



- Documented review of test binders, which included:
  - test plan
  - signature sheets

- observer forms
- staff non-disclosure agreements
- Interviews with select individuals including:
  - Principal
  - Test Coordinator
  - Test Administrators
  - Proctors
  - Other staff involved in testing where relevant
- DCPS assigned observers where relevant
- Students from 2011 flagged classrooms

 Follow-up visits and interviews occurred when additional information was needed

### RESULTS



 Confirmed cases of impropriety represent a very small percentage of public schools and classrooms in D.C.






### TOTAL CLASSROOMS FLAGGED

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## CLASSIFICATION OF FINDINGS

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#### **Critical**

Test tampering or academic fraud (e.g. providing students answers, use of electronic devices when prohibited)

#### **Moderate**

Defined violations NOT test tampering or academic fraud (e.g. refusal to sign non disclosure agreements, use of cell phones)

#### <u>Minor</u>

Test administration errors (e.g. incomplete or missing documents, inconsistent applications of test procedures)

### A&M RECOMMENDATIONS

#### For process improvements:

- Align documents and streamline forms
- Create one central location for forms on OSSE website
- Require training materials that LEAs are mandated to use
- Collect documentation that school-level training has taken place

- Tighter enforcement of protocols is needed
- Critical violations found in 3 classrooms
- Over 300 interviews were conducted by A&M
