### OSSE School Garden Program RFA Released

The School Gardens Program Request for Applications was released on December 12, 2011. This RFA will infuse \$200,000 into DC school garden programs. This grant will be administered by the Wellness and Nutrition Services Division within OSSE. Public and Public Charter schools and garden-based organizations are eligible to apply, however schools must partner with at least one DC-based school garden organization.

The RFA will award a maximum of \$10,000 to at least 20 schools/ organizations to fund schools garden coordinator positions, materials, and other necessary expenses to fund a sustainable school garden program. For more information please see the full RFA <u>here</u>.

# School Garden Spotlight:

#### **Bancroft Elementary**

Bancroft students have been busy in our school garden this fall. We have harvested and eaten the potatoes, carrots, beets, peppers, radishes and tomatoes that had been growing all summer long. We have a rule in the garden when we harvest food - "you don't have to like it, but you should try it." Everyone is encouraged to taste what we grow. It is amazing how excited kids are to eat what they have grown themselves. We have planted a variety of cold hardy crops such as lettuce, spinach, beets, broccoli and radishes. We hope to be able to harvest these through the fall, winter and early spring. Students have also spent a lot of time thinking of ways to improve our garden. Students have discovered that our soil lacks nutrients that our plants need to grow so we have begun worm composting and students have become experts on what we can feed our worms to make nutritious soil.

### Happenings: Fall

The section highlights seasonal activities in the garden.

"The third-graders started their final Garden Science lesson outside, harvesting radishes to take home and kale, spinach, and peas for their plant-parts stir-fry. After two months of weekly lessons, Washington Youth Garden classes in five local schools are now poised and ready for their inclass seeding projects this winter." – Center City Trinidad PCS

"We put garden blankets on some of our garden beds, so we are staying outside as long as possible! We recently dug up our fall/winter crop of potatoes, and the kids were excited to find lots of purple and golden buried treasure...we are making healthy French fries with them today." – DC Prep PCS - Benning Road Campus

"The Green Thumbs Garden Club has been using their summer produce, frozen for winter use (of course following food safety practices), to make various dishes during the cold months. In this picture, Ms. Crom serves up spaghetti "Bolognese", made with frozen tomatoes from our school garden, whole wheat spaghetti, and lean ground chicken to lighten up a usually heavy dish." – DC Prep PCS -Edgewood Campus

"We are still pulling up the last of the tomato plants, pulling out the last of the weeds, and believe it or not, still picking the last of an unbelievably hardy late crop of lettuce, also saving seeds from favorite plants for next year." – DCPS Garrison Elementary

"Because of the reflective qualities and heat retention of the south facing black top, the growing season of the raised beds atop the pavement warm up and stay warm longer than open parcels in the neighborhood. This has allowed temperature sensitive plants like basil, tomatoes and eggplants from freezing, as they would have in other nearby gardens." – Paul PCS

This November we partnered with Brainfood, a local non-profit that teaches high school kids life skills and leadership skills through food and cooking. Their "MVP's" (students who have graduated from their year-long program) planned and delivered a healthy cooking workshop to our second and third graders. They harvested greens and cabbages on the farm and then taught the students how to make healthy versions of classics like vegetable fried rice. We can't wait to have them back. – DCPS Walker Jones
