





What changes have been made to the child care licensing regulations?



Education Requirement Timeline

At a high level, the 2016 regulations established the following minimum education requirements

- Bachelor's degree with early childhood coursework for child development center directors
- Associate degree with early childhood coursework for child development center teachers and expanded home providers
- Child Development Associate (CDA) for child development center associate teachers, home providers and associate home caregivers
- Child development facilities could apply for a continuous service waiver for directors, teachers and expanded home providers with 10 years continuous service prior to 2016

The core of these standards has not changed; rather, the new licensing regulations recognize a broader range of pathways through which early educators can meet these requirements and allow a pathway for individuals to work while completing degrees/credentials required for their position.



Updated licensing regulations went into effect Dec. 20, 2023

- On Dec. 20, 2023, OSSE <u>updated the child care licensing regulations</u> regarding minimum education requirements for the early learning workforce.
 - Summary of Changes (Español | Amharic)
- The updated regulations maintain the District's commitment to high standards for early educators while providing additional pathways and flexibility in how early childhood educators can meet education requirements.
- These changes reflect input from early learning stakeholders, including early childhood educators, child care program operators and advocacy organizations, as well as lessons the OSSE has learned from supporting early childhood educators to meet degree and credential requirements.



Additional pathways to meet education requirements for center directors, teachers and expanded home caregivers

- Expand the list of majors recognized as equivalent to an early childhood education degree for center directors, teachers and expanded home caregivers.
- Expand the minimum education requirement for **teachers** to include the completion of 60 credit hours of college-level coursework in early childhood education or a related field, in addition to an associate or more advanced degree.
- Allow the completion of 60 credit hours of college-level coursework or a degree earned outside
 of the US to count toward the minimum education requirements for teachers with the
 submission of a foreign credential equivalency report.
- Reduce the number of credit hours required in early childhood education for a center director who has a bachelor's degree in another field from 15 to 12 hours.
- Reduce the number of credit hours in early childhood education required for a teacher or expanded home caregiver who has completed 60 credit hours or an associate or more advanced degree in another field from 24 to 12 hours.



Additional pathways for assistant teachers and associate home caregivers

• Expand the Child Development Associate (CDA) requirement for assistant teachers and associate home caregivers to include a comparable state-awarded certificate (from another state) approved by OSSE.



Expanded continuous service certification

- Provide for center directors who have continuously served in their role since Dec.
 2, 2006 or earlier to apply for a continuous service certification that waives the minimum education requirement.
 - This certification may be maintained by an individual irrespective of changes in employment (unlike current education waivers that apply to the facility).
- Provide for teachers, assistant teachers, home caregivers, expanded home caregivers and associate home caregivers who have continuously served in their role since Dec. 20, 2013 or earlier to apply for a continuous service certification that waives the minimum education requirement.
 - This certification may be maintained by an individual irrespective of changes in employment (unlike current education waivers that apply to the facility).
 - Absences from the labor force due to personal or familial caregiving responsibilities during that 10-year period will not count against the individual.



New enrollment-based certification

- **Teachers** or **expanded home caregivers** with a <u>Child Development Associate (CDA)</u> who are enrolled in a credential or degree program to meet the education requirement for their staff type may apply for an enrollment-based certification.
 - The certification is valid for four years.
- Assistant teachers and associate home caregivers with a <u>high school diploma or</u> <u>equivalent</u> who are enrolled in a credential or degree program to meet the education requirement for their staff type may apply for an enrollment-based certification.
 - The certification is valid for two years.



What are the credential/degree pathways for each position?



Center Director

A **center director** can meet the education requirement by meeting <u>one</u> of the following:

- Bachelor's degree in early childhood education or closely related field; OR
- Bachelor's degree in any subject area with at least 12 credit hours in early childhood education.



Teacher

A **teacher** can meet the education requirement by meeting any <u>one</u> of the following:

- Associate degree (or higher) in early childhood education or a closely related field; OR
- Completion of at least 60 credit hours or an associate degree (or higher) in any subject area with at least 12 credit hours in early childhood education; OR
- Enrollment in a degree program provided that the teacher holds a Child Development Assoicate (CDA) and earns an associate degree (or higher) within four years of their initial date of hire as a teacher at a child development center licensed by OSSE.



Assistant Teacher

An **assistant teacher** can meet the education requirement by meeting any <u>one</u> of the following:

- Child Development Assoicate (CDA); OR
- Associate degree (or higher) in any subject area; OR
- Completion of at least 60 credit hours in any subject area; OR
- State-awarded certificate comparable to a CDA that is approved by OSSE; OR
- High school diploma or equivalent, provided the individual earns a CDA within two years of their initial date of hire as an assistant teacher at a child development center.



Expanded Home Caregiver

An **expanded home caregiver** can meet the education requirement by meeting any <u>one</u> of the following:

- Associate degree (or higher) in early childhood education or a closely related field; OR
- Completion of at least 60 credit hours or an associate degree (or higher) in any subject area with at least 12 credit hours in early childhood education; OR
- Enrollment in a degree program provided the expanded home caregiver holds a Child Development Associate (CDA) and earns an associate degree (or higher) within four years of opening the expanded child development home.



Home Caregiver

A **home caregiver** can meet the education requirement by meeting any one of the following:

- Child Development Associate (CDA); OR
- State-awarded certificate comparable to a CDA that is approved by OSSE; OR
- Associate degree (or higher) in early childhood education or a closely related field; OR
- Completion of at least 60 credit hours or an associate degree (or higher) in any subject area with at least 12 credit hours in early childhood education.



Associate Home Caregiver

An **associate home caregiver** can meet the education requirement by meeting any <u>one</u> of the following:

- Child Development Associate (CDA); OR
- State-awarded certificate comparable to a CDA that is approved by OSSE; OR
- Completion of at least 60 credit hours or an associate degree (or higher) in any subject area; OR
- High school diploma or equivalent, provided the individual earns a CDA within two years of their initial date of hire as an associate caregiver at a child development home or expanded child development home.

DC Futures Program

The <u>DC Futures program</u> helps DC college students complete their first associate or bachelor's degree by providing a last-dollar scholarship (tuition, fees and cost of attendance) at three local universities in addition to college coaching and support services that will address personal and financial barriers to completion for all participants. The DC Futures application for the 2024-25 academic year opens March 11. Applicants must be able to demonstrate that they have been a DC resident for the past 12 months.

Mayor's Scholars Undergraduate Program

The Mayor's Scholars Undergraduate Program provides need-based funding for eligible DC residents earning their first associate or bachelor's degree at select area colleges and universities. The program is a last-dollar award meaning it can be used to fill the gap between a student's financial aid package and the cost of attendance. The Mayor's Scholars Undergraduate Program application for the 2024-25 academic year opens March 11.

DC Tuition Assistance Grant (DCTAG) Program

DCTAG is a student-level grant program that provides grants of up to \$10,000 toward the difference between in-state and out-of-state tuition at public colleges and universities to eligible DC residents.

If you plan to apply for the <u>Mayor's Scholars Undergraduate Program</u> or the <u>DC Futures Program</u>, OSSE recommends applying to DCTAG first. The DCTAG application opens March 11.

Other Scholarship Opportunities and Grants

- Child care providers may also want to look at additional financial assistance available at the college or university they are currently attending or interested in attending (<u>UDC</u>, <u>Trinity Washington University</u>, etc.)
- Federal Pell Grants
- Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
- Advancing Early Education Collaborative
 - Advancing Early Education Collaborative is an initiative between <u>American University</u> (AU), <u>Trinity Washington University</u> and Martha's Table.
 - The initiative includes a seamless articulation of academic pathways across institutions and "stackable credentials," starting with the Child Development Associate (CDA) and ending with a full bachelor's degree from either <u>AU's School of Education</u> or <u>Trinity</u> <u>Washington University</u>.



What options are available for early childhood educators who do not fully meet the credential requirements for their staff type?



Certifications

Continuous service

Enrollment-based

Individuals may maintain both types of certifications across changes in employment.

This means that early childhood educators may apply for a certification on their own, or a facility may apply on their behalf.



Who can apply for a continuous service certification

- Center directors who have continuously served in their role since <u>Dec.</u>
 2, 2006, or earlier.
- Teachers, assistant teachers, home caregivers, expanded home caregivers and associate home caregivers who have continuously served in their role since <u>Dec. 20, 2013</u>, or earlier.
 - Absences from the labor force due to personal or familial caregiving responsibilities during that 10-year period will not count against the individual.
- The continuous service certification does not expire.



Who can apply for an enrollment-based certification

- Teachers or expanded home caregivers with a CDA who are enrolled in a credential or degree program to meet the education requirement for their staff type.
 - The certification is valid for four years.
- Assistant teachers and associate home caregivers with a <u>high school</u> diploma or equivalent who are enrolled in a credential or degree program to meet the education requirement for their staff type.
 - The certification is valid for two years.



How to apply for certifications

- Waiver application(s) submitted by facility leaders prior to Dec. 20, 2023 on behalf of their staff will be evaluated based on the updated licensing regulations. OSSE will share determinations as soon as possible.
 - Neither the facility nor the individual staff person on whose behalf the facility submitted the waiver needs to submit another application.
- OSSE is currently preparing a new process for applying for certifications and will share more information about that process later this spring.
- As OSSE works to implement the new process:
 - Facility leaders who would like to apply for a certification for a member(s) of their staff or themselves may submit a <u>general waiver</u> and/or <u>10-years of continuous service waiver</u> application to the ECE Help Desk at <u>ECEhelpdesk@dc.gov</u>.
 - Early childhood educators who would like to apply for a continuous service certification and/or enrollment-based certification should contact the ECE Help Desk at ECEhelpdesk@dc.gov or (202) 478-5903. The ECE Help Desk will follow up with more information on how to apply for a certification(s) when it is available.



Do the updates to the education requirements change the minimum salaries for the Early Childhood Educator Pay Equity Fund?



Pay Equity Fund minimum salaries have not changed

- The updated child care licensing regulations do not change the FY24 minimum salaries for the Early Childhood Educator Pay Equity Fund or the child development facility (CDF) payroll funding formula calculation.
- The updated regulations allow early childhood educators who receive an enrollment-based certification to remain employed in roles they would not have been able to be employed in prior to the updates to the licensing regulations. However, in most cases, updates to the child care licensing regulations do not change the minimum salary the individual qualifies for.

How you can support your staff

- 1. Make sure early childhood educators employed at your facility are aware that the education requirements have been updated.
 - If you operate a child development center, <u>share this informational flyer</u> (<u>Español</u> | <u>Amharic</u>) with your staff.
 - If you operate a child development home, <u>share this informational flyer</u> (<u>Español</u> | <u>Amharic</u>) with your staff.
