

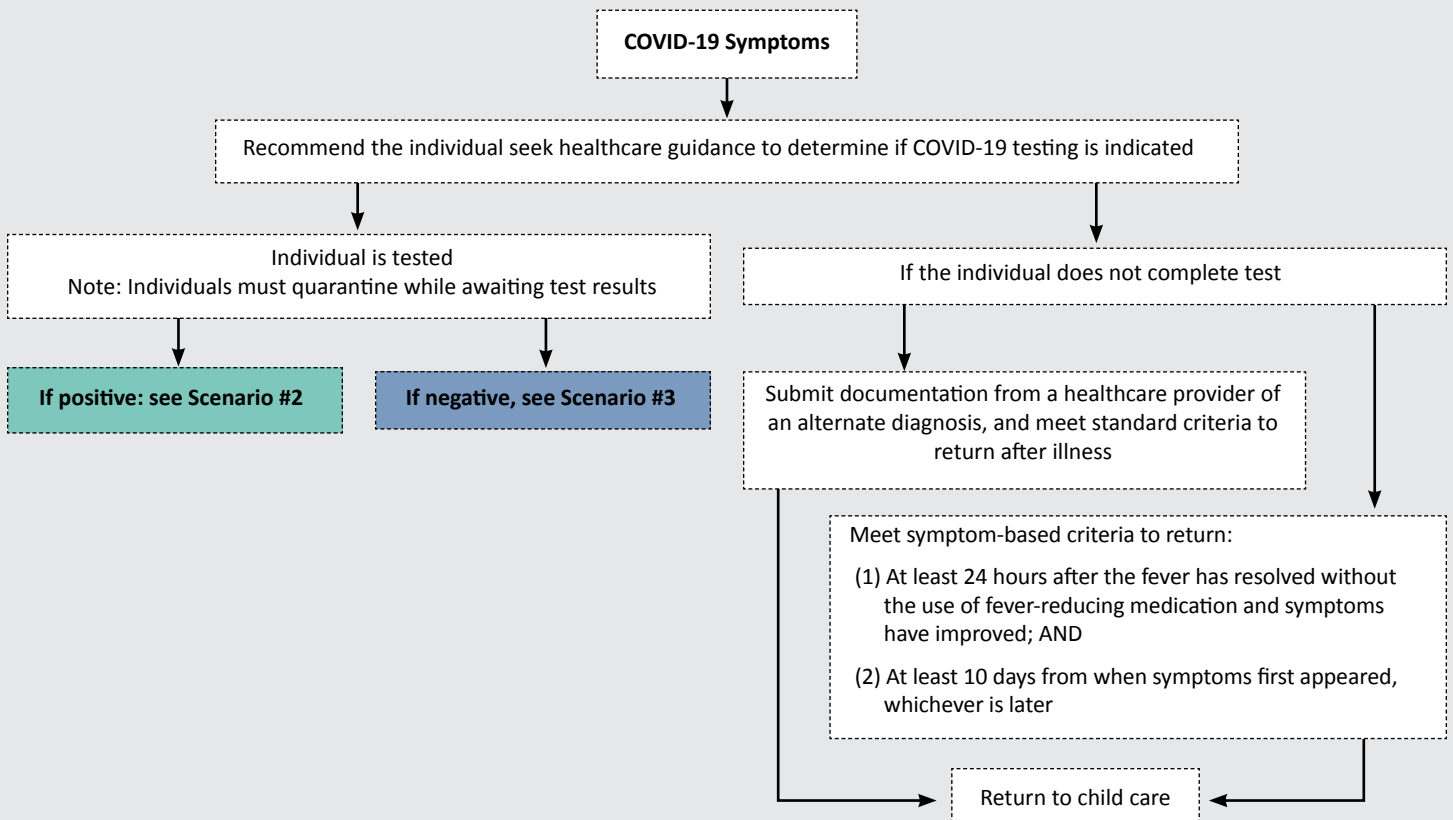

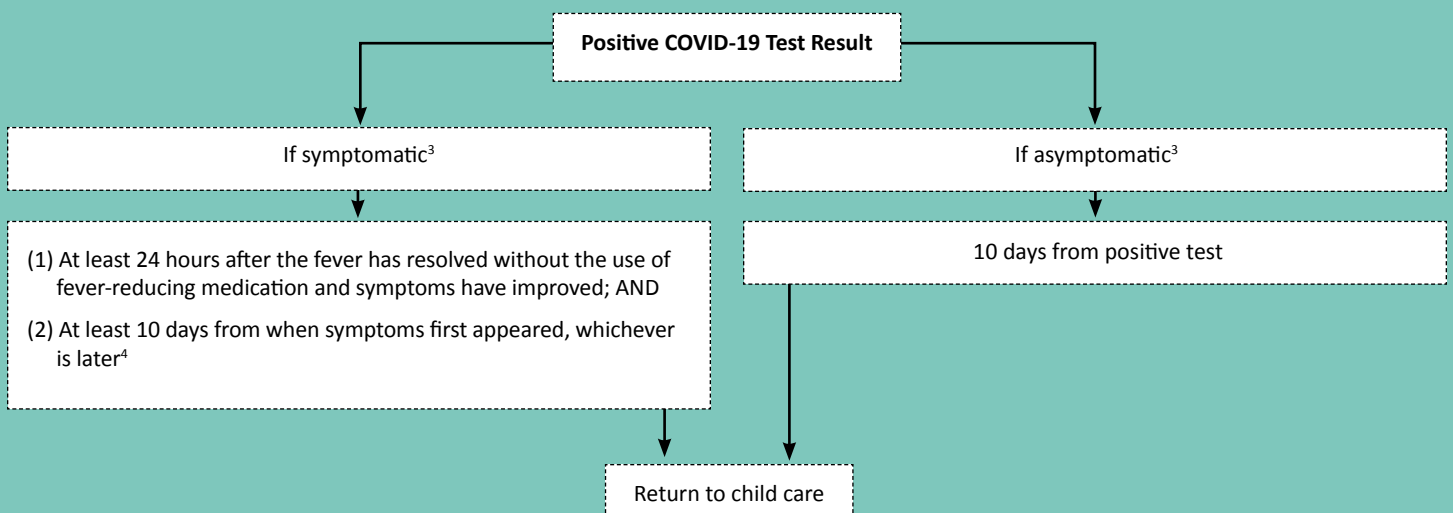
RETURN TO CHILD CARE CRITERIA

Note: These scenarios include standard criteria to return to care for children and staff. Individual guidance from DC Health or a healthcare provider would always supersede these criteria.

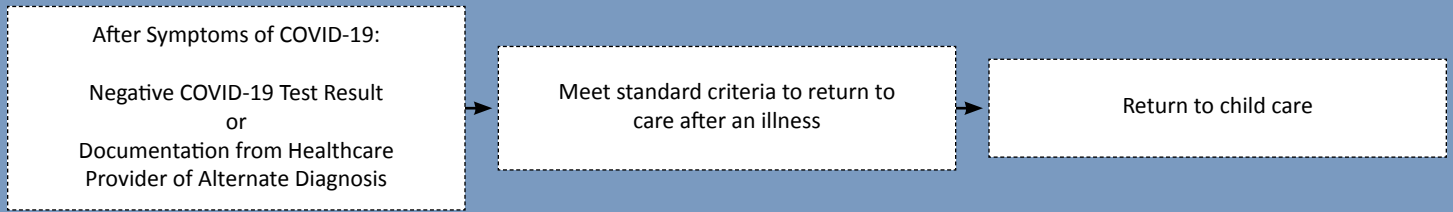
Scenario 1: Child or Staff Member with COVID-19 Symptoms¹



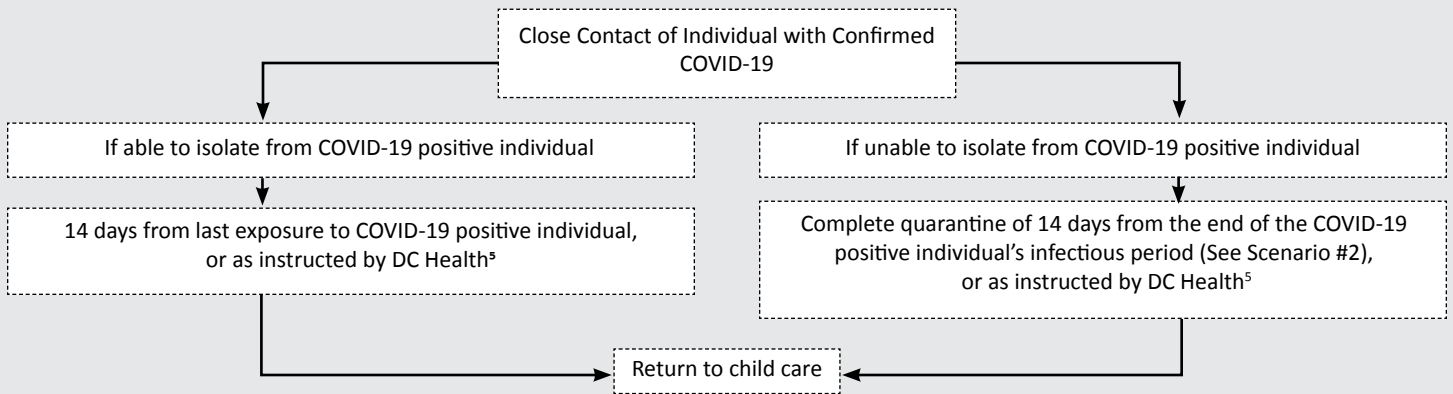
Scenario 2: Child or Staff Member with a Positive COVID-19 Test Result²



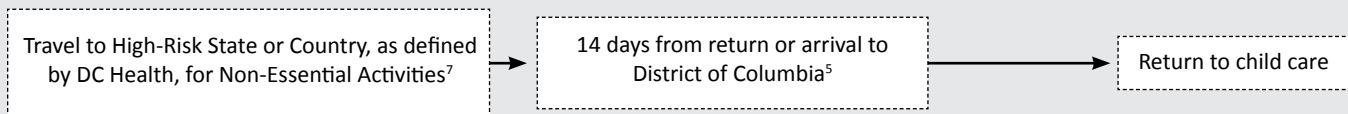
Scenario 3: After Symptoms of COVID-19, Child or Staff Member with Negative COVID-19 Test Result⁵ or Documentation from Healthcare Provider of Alternate Diagnosis



Scenario 4: Child or Staff Member is a Close Contact of an Individual with Confirmed COVID-19⁶



Scenario 5: Child or Staff Member Traveled to a High-Risk State or Country, as Defined by DC Health⁵



Endnotes

- 1 Children or staff with pre-existing health conditions that present with specific COVID-19 – like symptoms may not be excluded from entering the facility on the basis of those specific symptoms, if a healthcare provider has provided written or verbal documentation that those specific symptoms are not due to COVID-19.

- 3 In either case, close contacts (including all members of the household) must quarantine for 14 days.
- 4 Some individuals, including those with severe illness, may have longer quarantine periods per DC Health or their healthcare provider.
- 5 Per Scenarios 4 and 5, a negative test result after close contact with an individual with confirmed COVID-19 or travel to a high-risk state or country does *not* shorten the duration of quarantine of at least 14 days.
- 6 Per Scenarios 4 and 5, a negative test result after close contact with an individual with confirmed COVID-19 or travel to a high-risk state or country does not shorten the duration of quarantine of at least 14 days.
