What is ARROW?

ARROW is an opportunity for the District of Columbia to launch recruitment and retention activities that build knowledge, skills, professional opportunities and job satisfaction for school behavioral health professionals to enter and remain in the workforce through collaboration with local education agencies (LEAs), District colleges and universities, and school behavioral health organizations and partners.


How will ARROW address the need?

ARROW will recruit professionals into the school behavioral health workforce through initiatives that generate a career pathway from high school through post-graduate school job placement and is designed for an entry point at any level.

> ARROW will retain school behavioral health professionals through the implementation of a learning community and first-year cadres, that are informed by the workforce, to support providers in their professional growth, skill development, and wellbeing as school-based providers.

What are the intended outcomes?

- Have a well-established workforce pipeline for behavioral health providers with unique knowledge and experience in District schoolbased behavioral health services.
- Increase licensed school-based behavioral health providers who are bilingual and/or a District native.
- Maintain a school behavioral health workforce that provides quality services to District youth.
- Improve behavioral health outcomes for students.



Why is ARROW needed?

ARROW builds and sustains a behavioral health workforce that is representative of the District's youth, has the knowledge, skills, competencies and confidence to provide comprehensive behavioral health services in DC public and public charter schools and are provided the opportunities and supports to experience success and well-being in their work as school behavioral health professionals.

ARROW will use a two-pronged strategic partner framework to ensure opportunity for partner voice and align input for maximum efficiency. It comprises:

- 1. District government agencies, LEAs, and District colleges and universities in which ARROW projects will be implemented and will help ensure successful development and implementation; and
- 2. The Coordinating Council on School Behavioral Health and key partner groups (e.g., organizations and partners providing similar supports and programs to the school behavioral health workforce) that will support systems-level coordination and opportunities to amplify stakeholder voice.
