A collaboration between the parent, child, school, FST, and community



Head Start Family Engagement

- FST models a program that utilizes clinical and evidenced based approaches that builds relationships with families that support positive parent-child relationships, family well-being, and connections to peers and communities.
- The team is designed to support the mental, social, and emotional development of children from birth to age 5
- FST provides families with health, nutrition, social and other services while being responsive to each child and family's ethnic, cultural, and linguistic heritage

Who do we serve?

- Serve 59 Title I Elementary schools and Education Campuses
- Community Parent Outreach Coordinators work with 2-3 schools and serves an average of 275 families per year
- Case Management Specialists serve 2-4 schools and receives 100 referrals per year
