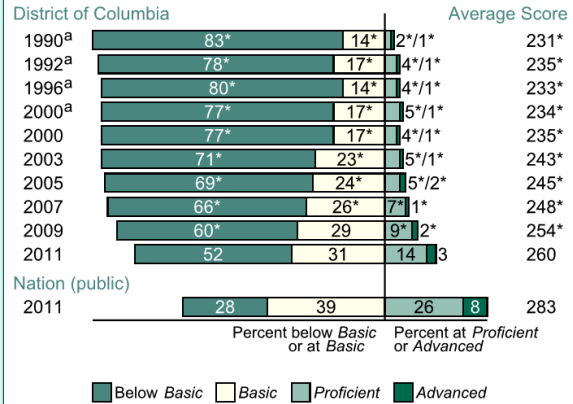


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in District of Columbia was 260. This was lower than the average score of 283 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in District of Columbia in 2011 (260) was higher than their average score in 2009 (254) and was higher than their average score in 1990 (231).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in District of Columbia at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 54 points. This performance gap was wider than that of 1990 (43 points).
- The percentage of students in District of Columbia who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 17 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (11 percent) and was greater than that in 1990 (3 percent).
- The percentage of students in District of Columbia who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 48 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (40 percent) and was greater than that in 1990 (17 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2011 to Other States/Jurisdictions

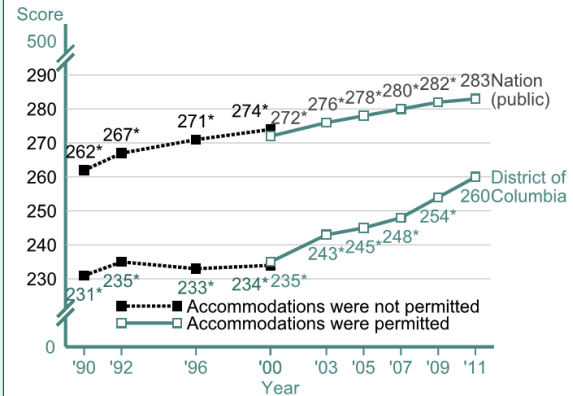

In 2011, the average score in **District of Columbia** (260) was

- lower than those in 51 states/jurisdictions
- higher than that in 0 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 0 state/jurisdiction

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 63 points lower than White students. Data are not reported for White students in 1990, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 58 points lower than White students. Data are not reported for White students in 1990, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2011, female students in District of Columbia had an average score that was not significantly different from male students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 25 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1996 (19 points).
