I. LEA Compliance with Secondary Transition Requirements

In FFY 2014, OSSE continues to implement a number of key strategies designed to improve LEA compliance with secondary transition requirements. First, OSSE is continuing its monitoring of secondary transition requirements as required via the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) established by OSSE and the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) in December 2009. OSSE's review of a sample of 100 IEPs for required secondary transition content will be followed by LEA notification of the findings of each review via reports issued using the District of Columbia Corrective Action Tracking System (DC CATS). These reports provide written notification to LEAs to correct identified noncompliance as soon as possible and in no case later than one year from identification. OSSE will also continue to provide ongoing technical assistance to LEAs as they receive findings issued though DC CATS.

OSSE continues to maintain a dedicated State secondary transition webpage for the District. This webpage, which is designed with input from OSSE's State Secondary Transition Community of Practice (CoP), has key secondary transition information and tools for all education stakeholders, including parents and students. This resource will be further enhanced by the District's new secondary transition public awareness campaign, "Get Started Now!", which was formally launched in October, 2014.

In FFY 2014, OSSE will continue its efforts to ensure systemic reform via comprehensive LEA training and technical assistance. The Division of Elementary, Secondary, and Specialized Education's Monitoring and Compliance Team, Teaching and Learning Team, and Special Education Data Team continue to support the SEA in developing and implementing a robust targeted technical assistance strategy informed by data.

OSSE's focused monitoring related to secondary transition resulted in an eight-month technical assistance plan for the schools most in need of support in meeting secondary transition requirements. The pilot project continued into FFY 2014 and will end in November of 2014. Based upon early indicators of success, OSSE plans to expand this effort in FFY 2014, with a goal of conducting focused monitoring in DCPS and 5 Charter LEAs.

Last, OSSE continues to execute plans to update the State's Special Education Data System (SEDS) in ways that will support increased compliance with secondary transition in areas where the data shows that LEAs are demonstrating the highest rates of noncompliance.

Progress related to OSSE's action plan to accelerate improvement related to compliance with secondary transition requirements (IDEA section 614 (d)(1)(A)(i)(VIII) and 34 CFR §§300.320(b) and 300.321(b)) is outlined below.

II. Implementation of a System of General Supervision Designed to Effectively Correct Noncompliance

In FFY 2014, OSSE continues to ensure that it uses all components of its general supervision system to timely identify and notify LEAs of identified noncompliance and the LEA's responsibility to ensure that all noncompliance is corrected as soon as possible and in no case later than one year after the date of OSSE's identification of the noncompliance.

OSSE continues to implement a robust compliance monitoring system and incorporate off-site record reviews and database monitoring into its general supervision system. OSSE is utilizing an internal accountability system that ensures that each LEA monitor tracks the timely closure of each finding of noncompliance for each of his or her LEAs. Monitors undertake a monthly review of the closure of noncompliance at each of their LEAs, and will use data from the DC CATS system to identify compliance items or corrective actions that are more difficult for LEAs to close in a timely fashion. This allows monitors to provide targeted support to LEAs in the areas of greatest need. Additionally, OSSE continues to use DC CATS to allow the SEA to accurately examine and track noncompliance identified in all areas, and to ensure that LEAs are timely notified of all noncompliance and to enable OSSE to more thoroughly analyze timelines, trends and areas to target for technical assistance.

OSSE's updated monitoring manual, training design and monitoring reports continue to emphasize the LEA's responsibility to ensure that all noncompliance is corrected as soon as possible and in no case later than one year after the date of the State's identification of the noncompliance (i.e., written notification to the LEA of the noncompliance). The updated manual and training also outlined the process for correction of noncompliance in accordance with OSEP Memorandum 09-02. OSSE continues to ensure that LEAs are made aware of their obligations and are supported in meeting them by offering an annual refresher training in the fall and subsequent regular opportunities for training and technical assistance throughout the school year. In the fall of 2014, OSSE monitors offered additional technical assistance on the requirements of OSEP Memorandum 09-02 and the components of on-site visits and quarterly database monitoring to LEA representatives either one-on-one or in small groups.

OSSE continues to develop its focused monitoring activities to assist LEAs with identifying root causes of systemic noncompliance and providing targeted technical assistance to improve practice. In FFY 2013, OSSE piloted focused monitoring in the area of secondary transition, and as noted in the previous section, OSSE continues to expand this work in FFY 2014 based on the positive results noted in participating pilot schools.

Progress related to OSSE's detailed action plan to ensure that its general supervision system continues to be reasonably designed to effectively correct noncompliance in a timely manner (IDEA sections 612(a)(11) and 616, 34 CFR §§300.149 and 300.600(e), 20 U.S.C. 1232d(b)(3), and OSEP Memo 09-02) is outlined in the following table.

III. Compliance with the Requirement to Conduct Timely Initial Evaluations and Reevaluations

In FFY 2014, OSSE continues its efforts to ensure that LEAs comply with requirements to conduct timely initial evaluations and reevaluations.

OSSE continues to make available LEA Planning and Performance Reports, which include initial evaluation and reevaluation metrics, through its recently launched Reports Framework. These reports are designed to assist LEAs in monitoring their own progress and identifying and resolving the root causes of delays. OSSE has been further refining these reports over the reporting period and vetting them with LEA users to ensure relevance related to problem solving and continuous improvement.

In addition, OSSE continues to expand upon an LEA support team model through which a cross-functional team will review initial evaluation and reevaluation data on a quarterly basis, provide technical assistance to identified LEAs with chronic noncompliance, and provide access to a consortium of specialized related service providers to assist LEAs whose reason for delay is lack of provider availability.

OSSE also continues to ensure that LEA leaders and staff are provided regular training and technical assistance opportunities to support improved practice. These opportunities include monthly webinars for LEA special education points of contact, a comprehensive training curriculum provided by the Division's Training and Technical Assistance Unit, dedicated support from QAM LEA contacts, and support provided via the Division's Policy Unit.

Progress related to OSSE's detailed action plan to accelerate improvement related to initial evaluations and reevaluations and ensure compliance with specific regulatory requirements (IDEA sections 612(a)(7) and 614(a) through (c) and 34 CFR §§300.301(c)(1) and 300.303) is outlined below.

IV. Directed Use of FFY 2014 State-level Funds to Address Longstanding Noncompliance with Timely Initial Evaluation and Reevaluation Requirements and Secondary Transition Requirements

Pursuant to the enforcement actions placed on the District of Columbia's FFY 2014 IDEA, Part B section 611 grant award, OSEP required that \$125,000 of the total grant award be used to further reduce the backlog of initial evaluations and reevaluations and increase progress toward ensuring timely initial evaluations and reevaluations. OSEP has also required that \$250,000 of the total grant award be used to address noncompliance with secondary transition requirements.

OSSE received approval to use \$250,000 of its state level funds to support key high leverage activities at the State level that it believes will accelerate progress in the area of secondary transition and \$125,000 of its State-level funds to support activities related to improvement in compliance with initial evaluations and reevaluation timelines.

Listed below is OSSE's FFY 2014 revised spending plan, which details how the FFY 2014 State-level funds will be used by July 1, 2015, and their intended impact:
