How is this process happening? The strategic plan was created. Four key priorities were laid out, which are- high quality actionable data, this helps us make informed decisions, also high quality programming and the idea that OSSE will provide customer service and the 4 th is being able to retain top notch talent so that we can keep good people. Our student achievement results, especially with special education students need to urgently be improved. We needed foundational services, which have been improved, but we need to improve the outcomes. We need to support the teachers that help the kids get
	Topic-ESSA HK spoke about the need for understanding where ESSA has come from. There are a lot of common elements with other states, but we want to make sure that DC includes things that are unique and needed for DC. The plan includes a year of feedback. HK thanked SAPSE for the feedback. We are excited about the implementation of the plan. Question 2: (From parent): How do you implement the initial special education process? What happens when kids need more assistance if they maybe exited from services? How can we tap into all the (special education) resources available? How do we track the success? Answer: HK response: We have some access to data and in the last years we have moved to other assessments. For example, these assessments that were once DC CAS showed that our students were getting to college and not being prepared. The new assessments essentially prepare our students and we need to make sure the bar is set in the right place. To the point of early intervention and resources HK apologized about the

	challenges faced. The point we are working on is the hand off within the transition. It is
	important for schools to follow up on this matter with parents.
