9:34 AM to 10:50 AM	Briefing by the Department on Disability Services (DDS), Andrew Reese, Director  Director Reese informed the SAPSE about eligibility of Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) services. Steps of the VR process for transition was explained. Step 1, open a case with DC Rehabilitation Services Administration (RSA). Step 2, explore what you want to be. Students explore interests and strengths with the support of VR counselor to develop an employment goal. Step 3, Develop the Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE), not to be confused with an IEP, Individualized Education Program. Step 4, prepare for employment. Step 4, prepare for employment. This means receiving any training services the student may need. Step 5, search for a job and get hired.
	The benefits of transition services are convenience, skill building and collaboration. RSA intake interviews and most IPE development meetings take place at the school. Students fain the skills and qualifications needed to enter the workforce. These activities provide students with the needed soft skills training which in turn builds the social skills necessary to sustain employment. Additional benefits include: decreased the gaps in vocational rehabilitation services between education and employment.

	Ombudsman Smith gave the SAPSE a broad overview of the Office of the Ombudsman. Items the office conduct: participate in formal investigations or administrative proceedings (such as administrative hearings), serve in any role that would compromise the neutrality of the office, make binding decisions. Majority of complaints come from Ward 8 and within special education, 41%. The Ombudsman shared the processes that occur specifically related to enrollment.

Middle school educators, administrators, and service providers play an important role in helping students with disabilities gain the skills they need to succeed in high school and in life. The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) requires IEP teams to develop a transition plan that contains postsecondary goals in the areas of education, employment, and independent living (when appropriate) for all students with disabilities age 16 and older.

This half-day session will introduce practitioners to the IDEA's secondary transition planning requirements and share ways in which middle schools can prepare students to actively engage in the transition planning process, including participation in:

- Career awareness and exploration activities;
- · Self-determination skill development activities; and
- Age-appropriate transition assessments that will guide IEP teams in selecting transition goals, services, and activities.

Participants may choose to attend one of two available sessions, which will be held on **Friday**, **Dec. 9**, **from 8:30 a.m.-12 p.m. or 1-3:30 p.m.** at OSSE, Third Floor Grand Hall Sides A/B.
