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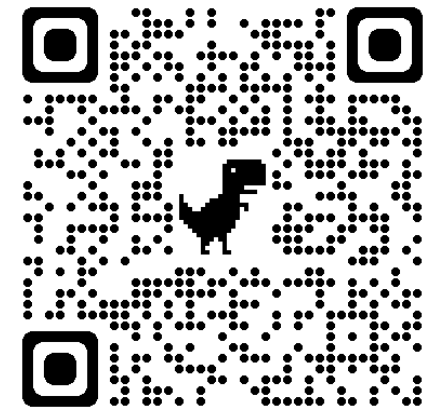

2023 Next Generation Assessment (NGA) Meeting Redesign

2023-24 NGA Meeting Redesign

- Purpose of the NGA Meeting
 - Provide high-level information
 - Communicate key dates
 - Avoid redundancy
 - Leave training information for assessment trainings
- Transition back to online meetings
 - Accounts for hectic schedules to increase participation
- Increased frequency
 - Reduces confusion and possible error by raising issues more regularly

2023 Test Integrity Investigations

Test Integrity Investigations Overview

- OSSE carefully reviews and analyzes state assessment results every year to ensure the results are valid and trustworthy in accordance with its obligations under the DC Testing Integrity Act of 2013, as amended in 2015.
- In instances where OSSE has determined that anomalies in a particular school warrant further investigation, OSSE will require LEAs to conduct an investigation at the school in order to gain an understanding of the cause or causes of the anomalies.
- Test integrity investigations in the District are OSSE-initiated and LEA-led.
 - The purpose of an LEA-led investigation is to gain an understanding of the cause or causes of the anomalies, and to help OSSE determine whether the assessment results that include such anomalies are valid and trustworthy.

Selection of Schools for Investigation

- OSSE reviews the following to determine if an investigation is warranted:
 - Incident reports submitted during administration
 - Administration practices (school test security plan submissions, materials issues, auditor observation reports)
 - Anonymous tips during or after administration
 - Data forensics analyses from the testing vendor
- If OSSE requests an LEA investigation, a detailed description of the factors that led to the request and supporting documentation will be provided.

2023 Test Integrity Investigations Timeline

- **Mid-October:** LEAs will be notified by OSSE if an investigation is needed and OSSE will provide O-TIP training
- **Late October/November:** LEAs conduct test integrity investigations
- **November/Early December:** OSSE analyzes LEA investigative notes, makes final determinations and delivers final reports to LEAs with findings and sanctions
- OSSE may contact LEAs to provide information about 2023 test integrity issues at certain schools that do not require a formal investigation, but concerns may be discussed with school personnel in order to ensure improvements for 2024 administration.

2023-24 Assessment Administration

Introducing... DC CAPE!

Staying the Same

- The assessments are required in the subjects of ELA, math and science
- Alignment with the state content standards
- Number and types of questions
- Testing platform for students
- Multiple reviews of all items by DC educators and OSSE staff
- Comparability to prior years of PARCC administration

What is New

- The name of the assessment system: DC CAPE assessments will include DC ELA, DC Math and DC Science
- The development by DC rather than a multi-state consortium
- The educator-facing assessment management platform



What to Expect

- DC CAPE assessments will first be administered in the spring of 2024.
- Students will have a nearly identical test-taking experience, including any needed testing accommodations. Most students will not notice any difference between this year and last year.
- Administrators will need some training on the new test management platform, but the basic processes are the same.
- OSSE will continue to be able to track academic recovery on an annual basis with no interruptions.
- Assessment results and individual score reports for students will be available along similar timelines as prior years.

Timelines for the DC CAPE Transition













- **Fall 2023 and ongoing:** Communications with LEAs and the public about the shift to DC CAPE
- **Winter 2023-24:** LEA training in the new assessment management platform
- **Spring 2024:** First administration of DC CAPE assessments
- **Summer 2024:** Results reported for DC CAPE assessments

2023-24 Statewide Assessment Policy Documents

Participation and Performance Policy Overview

- Participation and performance policies are largely consistent with prior years.
- The final policy for 2023-24 is available [on OSSE's website](#).
- Students participating in routine distance learning or hybrid learning will participate in assessments in person.
- LEAs can assess students at any time within the statewide window for each assessment.

New for 2023-24!

- WIDA Alternate ACCESS assessment now available for all grades K-12
- Includes information on DC CAPE required assessments
- Added attemptedness rule for DLM alternate science assessment:
 - For DLM, students must demonstrate that they have attempted to respond to at least one testlet in order for the test to be identified as attempted for participation and performance calculations.
 - This rule is aligned to the format of the DLM science assessment and consistent with other alternate assessments.
- Added table of contents for ease of use

2023-24 Required Statewide Assessments

In spring 2024, DC will administer the following required statewide assessments:

- **DC CAPE**
 - **English language arts/literacy (ELA):** Grades 3-8, ELA I and ELA II
 - **Mathematics:** Grades 3-8, Algebra I and Geometry
 - Students who took Geometry in middle school will take Algebra II in high school as their required assessment
 - **Science:** Grades 5, 8 and Biology
- **MSAA ELA and mathematics:** Grades 3-8, 11
- **DLM Science:** Grades 5, 8 and Biology
- **ACCESS for ELLs and Alternate ACCESS:** K-12
- **NAEP Reading and Mathematics:** Grades 4, 8 and 12 in selected schools
- **NAEP Science:** Grade 8 in selected schools

Exception for Advanced Middle School Math

- Students in grades 3-8 must take the assessment for the grade in which they are enrolled at the time of testing, unless they are taking an advanced mathematics course in grades 7 and 8 with an associated high school assessment.
- Students **in grades 7 and 8 only** who are taking advanced high school math courses may take the associated **Algebra I or Geometry** assessments in middle school instead of the grade-level math assessment.
- Students must still take at least one mathematics assessment in high school, per federal requirements.

Coming Soon

- 2023-24 Testing Accommodations Guides (TAGs)
 - The TAGs are updated annually and provide a crosswalk between accessibility features and accommodations that may appear in documentation, such as an IEP or 504, and how these features may appear in vendor assessment management platforms.
- 2023-24 Test Security Guidelines
 - The Test Security Guidelines is a document with key policies updated annually. Overall, policies in the Test Security Guidelines for the 2023-24 school year are consistent with policies from the 2022-23 school year.
- 2023-24 Test Security Training
 - Test Security Training requirements and materials will be published in November 2023

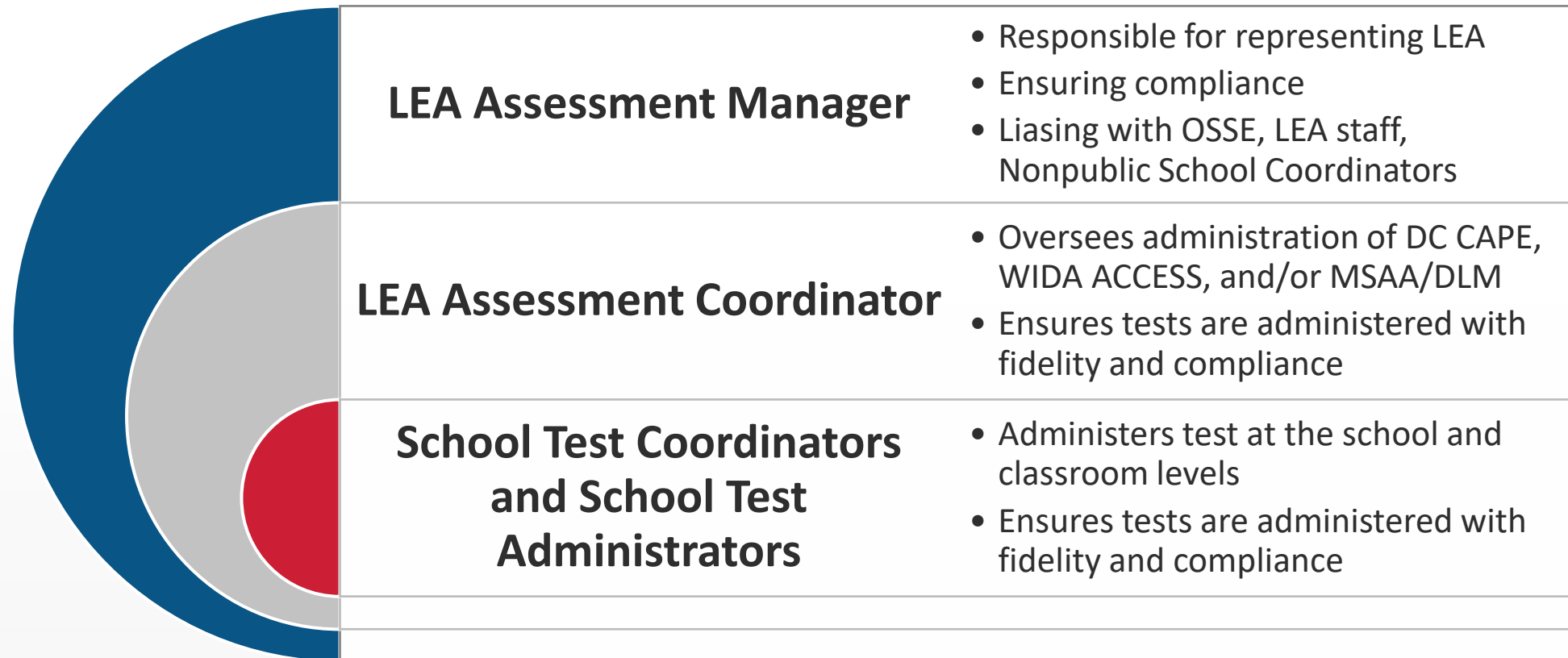

Upcoming ACCESS for ELLs Activities

2023-24 Upcoming ACCESS Activities

- Site ID updates due to OSSE on **Monday, Oct. 30**
 - LEA and school shipping address and contact information
- Pre-ID window will open in November
 - LEAs confirm ACCESS registered students and indicate accommodations
- **New for 2023-24:** OSSE has developed a 2-page ACCESS Readiness Guide with high-level activities for each month
 - Will be shared in NGA bulletin and posted on OSSE website

2023-24 ACCESS Training Requirements

- WIDA has made substantial changes to three ACCESS training courses
 - Online ACCESS for ELLs: Administration
 - Paper ACCESS for ELLs: Administration
 - Alternate ACCESS: Administration and Scoring
- OSSE requires that all ACCESS Test Coordinators and Test Administrators recertify for applicable assessments in 2023-24, which includes passing the Certification Quiz with a score of 80% or higher
 - Recertification date must be **on or after Sept. 1, 2023** for the courses listed above
- Kindergarten ACCESS recertification:
 - Required for Test Administrators
 - Recommended for Test Coordinators

2023-24 Alternate Assessment Processes and Updates

Alternate Assessment Eligibility

OSSE is committed to providing equitable assessment opportunities for all students in the District of Columbia. We are committed to working with our stakeholders to provide assessment options for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. Alternate statewide assessments are available for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities as an alternative to participating in the general statewide assessments.

Annually, students with the most significant cognitive disabilities who are determined eligible by OSSE for alternate assessment participation will take:

- Multi-State Alternate Assessment (MSAA) in grades 3-8 and grade 11
- Dynamic Learning Maps (DLM) science alternate assessment in grades 5, 8 and high school biology
- WIDA Alternate ACCESS in grades K-12

Alternate Assessment Eligibility Process: Who is eligible to apply?

To be determined eligible for alternate assessment participation, students must meet all the following **minimum** requirements:

1. The student has a **significant cognitive disability**.
2. The student is learning content linked to grade level Common Core State Standards (CCSS), Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) and WIDA English Language Development Standards (ELD).
3. The student requires extensive direct individualized instruction and substantial support in the grade appropriate curriculum.

Meeting these requirements does not guarantee approval for alternate assessment participation.

Alternate Assessment Eligibility Process: How do I apply?

For OSSE to review a student for alternate assessment eligibility for the 2023-24 school year, the following documentation must be made available in the **Special Programs Database**:

- There is an active individualized education program (IEP) on file that indicates “Alternate Assessment” selected by the IEP team
- There is a current, fully completed 2023-24 “DC Alternate Assessment Participation Decision Documentation Form” electronically in the Special Programs database. This form is embedded in the Special Programs database as the Statewide Alternate Assessment Participation Criteria form and must be dated within the last (3) calendar years.
- All sources of supporting evidence for the alternate assessment decision form must be uploaded into the Special Programs database and dated within the last (3) calendar years.
