

Reportable Illness and Communicable Disease in Child Care Facilities

Last Updated: April 29, 2024

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- Child Development Facilities must report incidents of reportable illness or communicable disease to <u>both OSSE and DC Health</u>:
 - FIRST: Submit Report to DC Health: <u>Health Surveillance and Disease Reporting</u>
 - Follow instructions for submitting a report to DC Health on the following pages
 - SECOND: Submit Report to OSSE: <u>Unusual Incident Report (UIR)</u>
 - Follow guidance on <u>Submitting an Unusual Incident Report</u>





STEP ONE: Visit <u>dchealth.dc.gov</u>.

STEP TWO: Select **"Child Adolescent and School Health"** in the navigation menu.

STEP THREE: "School Health Surveillance" dchealth.dc.gov/service/school-healthsurveillance-and-disease-reporting.



School Health Surveillance and Disease Reporting

The Division of Epidemiology - Disease Surveillance and Investigation coordinates with the School Health Nursing Program to monitor infectious diseases in District of Columbia schools. When a reportable communicable disease is confirmed or suspected among students, faculty, and staff members, a protocol is in place to monitor and minimize the spread of infectious diseases.

How to report a case?

For School and Child Development Facility Nurses and Staff

- · Refer to the list of Notifiable Diseases in the District of Columbia to determine which illnesses are reportable
- Review the School Nurse Disease Surveillance and Reporting Protocol
- For information on COVID-19, refer to <u>Schools and Childcare Programs September 26, 2023</u>
- · Report any unusual number of cases (3 cases or more that occur within 7 days) of illness whether reportable or not
 - · Gastrointestinal line list template to keep track of case information for gastrointestinal illness
 - Review the <u>Guidelines for Facilities During Outbreaks of Norovirus/Gastroenteritis: Recommendations</u>
 and Precautions
 - · Influenza line list template to keep track of case information for influenza
 - Outbreak Tracking line list template to keep track of case information for all other illnesses

Notifiable diseases should be reported using the Epidemiology Investigation Team (EIT) Portal

Note: Cases of <u>HIV/AIDS</u>, <u>Hepatitis</u>, <u>Tuberculosis</u>, and <u>Sexually Transmitted Diseases</u> should be reported to the <u>HIV/AIDS</u>, <u>Hepatitis</u>, <u>STD</u>, and <u>TB Administration</u> (HAHSTA).

STEP FOUR: Click on the "Epidemiology Investigation Team (EIT) Portal" <u>link</u>.

STEP FIVE: Fill out and submit a Consult Form: dccovid.force.com/NonHealthcareConsu ltRequestForm/s/

- Provide as much information as possible whatever is available to you at the current time.
- The consult form contains data elements such as:
 - Point of Contact Information (submitter name, email, title, etc.)
 - Child Care Center Information (establishment name, phone, address, etc.)
 - Suspected Disease and Number of Individuals Exposed
- If you have information for a line list, check the box for "I have a list or need template to upload".
- Click on the XLS icon to download the line list template.
- Once you have filled out the line list, save it as a CSV file and upload it to the form.
- Complete the rest of consult form and submit to DC Health.



Use the School Nurse Disease Surveillance and Reporting Protocol to determine which illnesses are reportable, the number of cases are required for reporting, where to report, and what information to include in your report.

• Outbreaks in childcare facilities are defined as 3 cases within a 7-day period

Common outbreaks in school include:

Hand, Foot, and Mouth DiseaseHead LiceStrep ThroatImpetigoPink Eye (conjunctivitis)Impetigo

• Some illnesses must be reported when 1 case is identified including:

Pertussis (whooping cough)	Meningitis
Varicella (chickenpox)	Mumps
Measles	Rubella

What happens after you report to DC Health? DC Health will:

- Review information submitted
- Conduct follow-up with submitter and school-level point of contact
 - DC Health may request additional information
- Conduct outreach to cases/cases' proxies
- Provide fact sheets, public health recommendations, and letter for parent/guardian distribution
