Purpose of Document: The Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE) is publishing this document to present an overview of resources and learning opportunities on social emotional and trauma-informed practices and coronavirus (COVID-19) related supports. The document includes;

OSSE-Funded Professional Development and Training Platforms and Resources

Professional Development Information System (PDIS): The PDIS is a web-based professional development portal that includes a host of online course offerings for teachers, administrators, coaches and technical assistance providers. Topics include sessions on understanding the Business and Program Administration Scales, the Creative Curriculum, the Environment Rating Scales and the DC Early Learning Standards. All staff employed at a licensed child development facility are required to have a PDIS account. Quorum E-learning Platform: Quorum is an online professional development resource full of engaging and interactive training courses. The platform allows child development staff unlimited 24/7 access to the Quorum catalog, including those required for obtaining a Child Development Associate (CDA). OSSE sponsors subscriptions to the Quorum online training platform and through these subscriptions, child development staff can access over 140 hours of training offered in the Quorum catalog, most of which are available in English and Spanish. The Quorum e-learning platform can be accessed via quorumlearning.com.

Early Childhood Investigations: The Early Childhood Investigations is a website of live and archived recordings of early childhood education professional development resources. This resource is available for free and is approved by OSSE to support early childhood educators in meeting their annual professional development topic and hour requirements. OSSE's Distance Learning for Early Childhood Education Guide: The how-to-guide was developed to support center directors, owners and early care and education programs in preparing and adapting learning activities and strategies at home, the overall transition to distance learning. Only 20-30% of these children are identified as needing help before kindergarten, meaning the vast majority miss out on the benefits of early intervention. Because early educators spend so much time with children, they are in a great position to change this. The Nuts and Bolts of Developmental Screening covers the importance of developmental monitoring and developmental screening, as well as how to monitor, choose a screening tool, talk with parents, use screening results in the classroom, and more. Participants will practice monitoring and will do a thorough review of multiple screening tools.
To Expel or Not to Expel	Available 24/7 once logged into personal Quorum account	Recent studies reveal that expulsion and suspension in early child care programs are 10 times more likely than in K-12. Furthermore, these data suggest disturbing gender and racial disparities in the practice. Children who are expelled or suspended from school are more likely to experience academic failure and grade retention, hold negative views of schools and education, are at greater risk of dropping out, and have increased rates of incarceration. To Expel or Not to Expel covers the conditions and risk factors that lead to expulsion and suspension, strategies to promote social-emotional development in children and personal well-being in educators, ways to develop trusting partnerships with families, and discipline practices that reduce the risk of suspension and expulsion.
Enriching Indoor Environments	Available 24/7 once logged into personal Quorum account	An early childhood environment is many things: it's a safe place where children are protected from the elements and are easily supervised, and it is where important activities of the day take place, such as playing, eating, sleeping, and learning. Beyond the basics, the physical environment is an image of the teacher's planning and the student's learning. It should be well organized, comfortable, and personable and offer a variety of materials for cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development. In this course, participants will learn best practices in designing an inclusive indoor environment that fosters children's developmental growth. While some people easily bounce back from adversity brought on by these types of traumatic events, others struggle to overcome the experience and its aftereffects. Resilience - the ability to adapt or recover from a difficult event - can be learned during childhood or later in adulthood. This course is divided into two parts. Part I is about adults – the impact of stress on the body and mind, how resilience affects well-being, and how to build resilience before and after natural disasters. Part II is about children – supporting children after natural disasters, recognizing when a child might need extra help recovering, and building resilience to improve their ability to "bounce back" throughout life.
