The Office of the State Superintendent of Education, Adult and Family Education (OSSE AFE), in partnership with the University of the District of Columbia (UDC), is hosting a mini-professional development (PD) institute for adult education providers, training providers, workforce development providers, partner agencies and other stakeholders from Monday, **Jan. 29** to Wednesday, **Jan. 31, 2024**. - <u>College and Career Readiness Standards for Adult Education</u> The College and Career Readiness Standards (CCR) for Adult Education reflect the content most relevant to preparing adult students for success in colleges, technical training programs, work and citizenship—in the areas of English language arts/literacy and mathematics.
- <u>EdTech Integration Strategy Toolkit</u> The EdTech Integration Strategy Toolkit is designed to help educators build effective strategies for instruction that integrate technology while developing learners' digital skills. The app helps educators and trainers find strategies, resources and activities to support meaningful edtech integration and digital skill development.
- English Language Proficiency Standards for Adult Education The English Language Proficiency (ELP) Standards for Adult Education (AE) are intended to address the need for educational equity, access, and rigor for adult English learners (ELs) as states adopt challenging academic content standards for adult education with the goal of ensuring that adult learners are prepared for careers and postsecondary education.
- <u>Essential Education</u> OSSE AFE provides Essential Education, an instructional software that includes CASAS Academy, Computer Essentials, GED Academy, Money Essentials and Work Essentials, to DC providers and partners.
