- Percent of students tested disaggregated
- •Other academic indicators disaggregated (attendance & grad rate)
- •Two year achievement trends
- •List of schools with school improvement status levels
- •Highly qualified teacher data
- •Student achievement on the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)
